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WHERE IS GOD?



Everyone is straining to know *why*. This is a natural reaction. After all, we are wired to want to understand. However, the staggering scope of violence unleashed in Newtown, Connecticut, defies human comprehension.

What caused this hellish fury of rage to burst upon a peaceful scene filled with children who only had arrived moments earlier at their school?

Arriving in the shell-shocked small town in his state whose carnage likened a grizzly wartime crime, Governor Dan Malloy tersely stated that, "evil has visited this community." No truer words could have been spoken.

Some characterize God's opponent as a comical figure and dismiss the devil altogether. Others depict God's opponent as a vestige of uneducated people from a dark middle age and similarly scorn people of faith. Of this I am certain: *whoever rebuffs the existence of a real spiritual battle at play always upon the human stage is a fool.* I commend President Obama for having set aside pressing political interests and choosing to speak more as a parent in addressing the heinous slaying of innocents. It is instructive that he offered consolation and hope to a reeling nation by invoking God's Holy Name and quoting Sacred Scripture.

Both leaders demonstrated keen perspective about vital spiritual dimensions that best are kept in view.

For decades, God has been removed from our daily living, pushed further and further toward the periphery of our ordinary experiences. Places and events formerly marked by Judeo-Christian prayer and filled with revered symbols of faith, have been assailed by pagans and atheists who have managed to find favor with key judges and other select leaders in local, state and federal governments.

Lest you find my claim exaggerated, kindly allow me to provide a few current examples:

• Scores of lawsuits filed against municipalities have forced the removal of numerous manger scene and other Christian images from public areas where they have been displayed without controversy for generations.

• Aggressive legal actions or fears of their being levied have silenced the singing of Christmas carols in many public places and within an increasing number of government institutions.

• Religious peoples and groups who hold to the truth that human life begins at conception, including Catholic churches, Catholic schools, Catholic hospitals, Catholic continuous care facilities and Catholic charities, are told to renounce their fundamental belief under government aegis and ordered to help provide tax-funded pills designed to cause abortions. The same hostile action is directed toward private employers who are people of devout Christian faith.

Wrongful actions used to be described as sinful and offensive to God, for that is what they are. More recently, pressures are underway to term these same immoral activities as "dysfunctions" or "disorders" with no reference at all to God or clear indications of their depravity. There even are some who have issued calls for deeds resolutely condemned in Sacred Scripture and Judeo-Christian tradition to be reclassified as healthy and normal.

A basic axiom of physics is that nature abhors a vacuum. Applied to the supernatural, the elimination of God brings that which is not of Him filling the void. The abolition of God and removal of sacred items from ordinary living does not create a neutral space, a sort of cultural Switzerland. Just as water pours into an open cavity when it can, so too does God's opponent – the devil, Satan – seize an opportunity to confuse our minds and harden our hearts. Our Lord Himself says as much when He warns, "the one who is not with me is against me" (Luke 11:23).

As I see it, we have driven God from our daily living. We have marched God straight out of the ordinary experiences that define our local, state and national communities. No longer is the place reserved for the sovereign God whose Holy Name now seems such a threat to the fabric of our republic that it no longer even is permitted to be spoken reverently in many public and government locations where it formerly was honored.

Ought we really to be aghast that a culture seeking to drive God from our daily experiences seemingly has accomplished much of what it set out to become?

And yet the shrill cries still are heard: "where is God?"

The very instant the extreme wickedness commenced, *God was present*. How? *God was present* in the teachers and administrators who dared to put their own lives between a frenzied killer and their children. *God was present* in the police and other law enforcement officers who unhesitatingly risked their lives in order to champion an even higher good. *God was there* inspiring heroic strength within other first responders who witnessed the fires of hell and still pressed forward to defend and protect members of their community – some whom they may have known, others who were complete strangers. In the face of unspeakable evil, *God poured out* His love and compassion through the tear-filled embraces of parents and children in the fire house and throughout the community. *God was present* in the local churches and places of worship that still cannot begin to contain the total numbers of people seeking God in their darkest hour.

Some will opine the situation and its aftermath has nothing to do with God. They are fools.

A final thought: imagine if we choose to reverse the rising godless cultural tide. For instance, how might daily living change if we resolutely took to heart God's 10 Commandments instead of debunking them? Most assuredly, ordinary living would be much safer and more fulfilling for all people.

Maybe God knows what He has done and desires still to do for us.
