JoAnn Newmeyer new SVdP president

AS LITTLE FLOWER'S St. Vincent dePaul ministry moved into parish house quarters, **JoAnn Newmeyer** began work as its newly elected president.

JoAnne joined the parish a year ago after moving from Michigan. She almost immediately began volunteering at the St. Vincent de-Paul ministry, in its work to feed, clothe, and in other ways help less fortunate neighborhood people.

A social worker 15 years, she says, "Being involved in the St. Vincent de Paul Society is a good fit for me and gives me a chance to give back to the community as well as utilize my social work skills to assist those in need."

The SVdP chapter of that international society is one of Little Flower's busiest, with parish volunteers going in and out of the parish house quarters to fill shelves and refrigerators and, two days a week, to distribute to people who arrive to be aided by the ministry.

JoAnn said she was quickly struck by how dedicated the organization's work was. "The goal of our ministry is to treat those we encounter, our brothers and sisters in Christ, with dignity and respect. We do not question the need and we don't turn people away without some type of assis-

tance, even if it is a phone number to another church or social service agency," she said.

The new SVdP leader said she recognizes the legacy LF has and the work of its leaders before her.

"The Little Flower St. Vincent de Paul Society is a vibrant group providing needed service to the community. I only knew former president **Bob Kertesz** a short time, but I often feel his presence and influence. By his leadership, and the dedication and hard work of recent presidents **John Saggesse** and **Frank Reynolds**, it has grown and developed. have left me with big shoes to fill. I especially thank them for the work in moving into the Parish House." **Dianne Brandt**, a longtime worker and leader in that ministry, said, "JoAnn offers person-to-person service to all our

members and most especially the suffering and needy. I personally witness each week her compassion and belief in the dignity of the hu-

man person. Under her leadership, Little Flower SVdP will certainly experience growth and exciting change in the years ahead."

JoAnn said she has been impressed by the commitment of Little Flower "to provide food, clothing, and household items to the needy. We provide groceries and other items to more than 500 people a month, a considerable feat for a group of volunteers! I have respect and admiration for members who volunteer many hours to purchase food at best prices, stock pantry shelves, distribute food, and collect and distribute.



"Our members also pray together and support each other in our "inner ministry"."

The new Vincentian leader said she recognizes the commitment of many at LF. "The food baskets we distribute at Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter to more than 300 families can only be done with the help of the Boy Scouts collection. Every day our office is open, parishioners donate clothing, canned goods, blankets, and household items. We are able to continue in this ministry due to support of Little Flower parishioners, which we greatly appreciate.

JoAnn's daughters, Central Catholic High School graduates, are Annaliese, studying for a masters degree in education, and Kate, with a social work degree living in North Carolina.

Music is their ministry

FOR Mike and Debbie Bercher, their love for Little Flower Church always has come back to music.

The Berchers have sung (Debbie) and strummed guitar (Mike) at Sunday masses for more than 34 years.

"Well, I sing, too, but Deb has the real voice," said Mike with his usual broad smile.

Mike's guitar has accompanied Debbie's crystal-clear voice in solos, with small groups and entire choirs, at weekend liturgies, special ministry and retreat teams, and Christmas cantatas,

Both have been involved in many events and activities in the parish, but their uninterrupted ministry has always put them front and center to lead the singing at perhaps as many as 1,500 liturgies. Almost the only interruption has come about as they deal with Mike's cancer, diagnosed last year.

Churchgoers in recent weeks have missed the ever-smiling couple and their special music that has

added their signature spirituality to so many liturgies. Mike and Debbie, who raised two children, **Mark** and **Jennifer**, have worked with six pastors, beginning in 1978. In those early years, they joined other musicians and voices to make music that, at the time, was often known as "folk masses."

Mike and Debbie Bercher have sung 10,000* songs for us

teams, and councils. A banker, Mike has served many years on the parish finance committee and was an original member of the Seeds of Faith Steering Committee. Both have been active in parish retreats, usually tapped to provide, or add to, the music.

The Berchers' commitment to the health and wealth of the parish community has sometimes led them to openly encourage fellow Little Flower families to do likewise.

They have, in fact, talked to congregations from the pulpit about the rewards of stewardship. At one mass a couple years ago, Mike described the sense of spiritual well-being that comes with contributing talent, energies, time, and financial offerings to the service of God and his people.

"We all can give what we can of ourselves," Debbie, too, told a congregation. "For us, first we

share our talent for music. Then we share what we can in money or time."

Mike always has echoed that "Deb and I give what we, like anyone else, can give, not because we have to but because we want to. We believe that we, as Christians, should take care of what God has entrusted to us."

"Tomorrow's" Church still *places the Eucharist at the center* of its entire life. It sets its sights squarely on the Lord and does everything "in memory of Him" (Luke 22:19).

It is a Church that interacts with contemporary culture, diverse peoples, confidently and compassionately *proclaiming the simple words of Christ's Gospel.*

It is a Church that *says more by its actions than its words*, witnessing conformity between what it says and the actions that follow.

It is a Church that is especially *attentive TO the presence of the Spirit* in ordinary experience, however the Spirit may choose to appear.

'Let us dare to build the Church of tomorrow together' It is a Church acutely aware of the arduous and difficult journey that characterizes the trek of far too many people. It wants to share deeply in other's sufferings so to be an *instrument of Christ's peace and hope*.

It is a Church that does not privilege any one category of persons, instead *welcoming all people with love* and forming its own to love in imitation of Christ's love.

It is a Church that respects venerable institutions yet remembers Peter's words: ". . . better to obey God than men" (Acts 5:29).

Let us, then, dare to build the Church of tomorrow together, making certain our parish is anchored wholeheartedly in the Catholic Tradition while remaining open to the Spirit of God.
