

## Resurrection: fulfillment of His Life

THROUGHOUT this Easter season, I especially hope you consider the connection between the two supreme moments in the life of Jesus: death and resurrection. For sure, the second mo-

ment forever surpasses the first; however, it does not cancel it.

Jesus' Resurrection unleashes the fulfillment of the life. Jesus' Resurrection splendidly displays the effects of God's *real and lasting love* for us. The light of Jesus' Resurrection does not make the cross disappear. Life is no less hard for those of us Christians who dare to believe in Jesus' triumph over the grave. Jesus' Resurrection does not eliminate suffering. It is not as if the empty grave opens a secret passage across the earthly stage that is free from difficulties, setbacks and pain.

What the glorious event of Jesus' Resurrection does make possible, however, is to provide those daring to know *Jesus as Lord*,

Savior and Messiah with a deeper understanding and true experience of God's mysterious gift of life

Jesus' Resurrection boldly proclaims that God's gift of life is meant to be meaningful, purposeful, and joyful.

At the very center of human living each and every day, we Christians hold to the undeniable truth that God's love bursts forth! That is, Jesus' Resurrection floods the love of God into every difficulty, every setback and every experience of pain.

Resurrection Joy is experienced in the midst of things that have not changed physically. We Christians still experience sickness, violence, social upheaval, hatred, and death. What Jesus' Resurrection does, however, is to transform everything we know and experience from absurd to astonishing, from meaningless to meaningful, from limited to limitless, from death to life.

## Parish embraces ACTS



LITTLE FLOWER Parish is the first, and so far only, Catholic parish in Ohio to support the growing ACTS retreat movement.

The Toledo parish brought the weekend program to this part of the Midwest with ACTS retreats for men in March and women in April.

The Thursday-Sunday retreats at the Weber Center in Adrian, MI., were conducted by teams from St. Louis and Louisville plus Little Flower men and women who had previously made ACTS retreats.

ACTS stands for the program's structure of **Adoration, Community, Theology,** and **Service**. The LF web site describes it as "More than a simple retreat 'program,' ACTS is designed to implement the 'New Evangelisation' in a way that transforms parishes into intentional disciples." ACTS began in San Antonio, TX in 1987 and has spread nationally and internationally.

"Parishioners (who participate) come together to experience how their daily lives are fun-

damentally impacted by the Word and Sacraments of our faith," according to literature.

The cost of the retreat is \$225. A parish brochure notes that "Anyone needing financial assistance can apply for a scholarship to help cover the cost."

Following the initial retreat weekend, **Fr. Dave Nuss**, Little Flower pastor, announced that a men's ACTS will be planned for the fall and a retreat for women in spring of 2015.



'I could not part from it'

Father Dave's Bible seems to be attached to him

Little Flower parishioners are accustomed to seeing Fr. Dave Nuss as he celebrates masses with his old bible tucked under his arm or open for reading a passage



dog-eared, an obviously well-used Holy Bible seldom leaves **Fr. Dave Nuss'** hand as he celebrates mass.

The Little Flower pastor clutches the tattered Bible while sitting in the presider's chair and while he's at the ambo to read the gospel. He carries the old book as he roams the sanctuary to preach, often flipping it to a marked page to read a verse. He keeps it close during the Eucharistic liturgy.

At the end of mass, he tucks the beat-up book of scriptures under his arm as leaves the sanctuary.

And the dilapidated tome stays in his grip while he greets people on their way out of church.

The Bible – its cover torn, bent, partly missing -- seems to be as much a part of Father Dave as his Roman collar or everpresent smile.

Some parishioners surely must wonder: What's the deal with the old Bible, Father?

Well, says Father Dave, it isn't that he can't afford to buy a new one

The creased and crinkled Bible has been with him, he says, since long before he was a priest and, yes, he would find it difficult to ever part with it.

"It has remained with me, as my personal use Bible, at every step of my priestly life and ministry," says Father Dave, "in Sandusky, in Washington, DC, in Cologne, Germany, and now Toledo . . . and on spiritual pilgrimages elsewhere at various places throughout the United States and Europe."

It was a gift while he was in high school in Wisconsin.



"My parents asked me if I would speak about the importance of the Holy Eucha-

rist in my life to men from [our] parish who were participating in a weekend retreat. I was honored by the request, though I was only a high school senior. I was unsure what I would be able to share with the men that they did not already know.

"After my straight-from-the-heart witness talk, they presented me with [this] leather-bound copy of the Catholic Jerusalem Bible."

Father Dave said it was "my first adult Bible" and he took it with him to college in Milwaukee. After graduating from Marquette University, he took it with him to begin studies for the priesthood. "I had it in my hands when I arrived at the seminary in Cincinnati."

It was there that the Bible took on a life of its own in a personal – and irreplaceable – way. "I began writing notes on the margins during classes and while at prayer," Fr. Dave says.

Which is why replacing the Bible would not really replace it with one that had his years of notes and reminders scribbled on Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, and other pages.

"I simply could not part from it with all the notes that had filled the margins over the years."

The Bible survives, read and reread, and patched up, says Fr. Dave. "Rather than purchase a new one, along the way it's been re-bound three times." From the looks of it, it could use another cover and binding.

But, frankly, he says, his old personal Bible, with scrawls, notes, underlines, and bent pages, is nearly worn out. "One of these days it'll just fall apart," Fr. Dave says with a sigh.





The choirs will sing for Pope Francis in St. Peter's Square on New Year's Eve. The day before, the combined Toledo-area choirs will sing during mass in St. Peter's Basilica.

On New Year's day, they will join with the Sistine Chapel Choir during mass, according to The Blade.

The Blade story noted the parishes are raising funds for the trip that will begin Dec. 26 and include visits to Assisi and Florence.



## **Lunch break for LF seniors**



The miraculous event of Easter does not take these harsh realities away. Instead, Jesus' Resurrection resolutely states that the confounded consequences of original and personal sins no longer have complete hold over us. Not only are the depraved marks of our fallen human state suddenly unable to keep us from loving and being loved, but by means of Jesus' Resurrection, it now becomes

possible for every person to discover the fullness of life and love for which we have been made by God to experience. Love alone!

As one like us in all things but sin, Jesus understands life and love. Jesus' own suffering, death and resurrection *for us* and *for our salvation* assures us that whoever dares to live in



love – that is, sincere self-giving in imitation of Jesus – never is abandoned by God.

Pope Francis reminds us that Christians follow Jesus by personally knowing Him in the same way we build strong and lasting friendships with others. This is the path by which we are welcomed by God, loved by God and redeemed by God. This way – Jesus' Way – brings forth the fullness of life and joy for which we have been made by God to experience.

Those daring to love in imitation of Jesus and develop a deeper relationship with Him and His Church receive His very life! Seen in this light, Easter joy is hardly fleeting or forgettable. It is neither a momentary delight nor a superficial sentiment. Easter joy radiates real and lasting hope through the cross.

# Carol Huss ends days at LF

Retiring principal reflects on 25 years

AFTER 25 years as principal of Little Flower -- now St Benedict -- Catholic School, Carol Huss will retire at the end of the school year. Here, Mrs. Huss reflects on her years on the LF campus.

ON MARCH 10 I announced to the board of trustees of St. Benedict Catholic School that I will retire at the end of this school year. Over the next couple of days the news was announced to faculty, staff, parents, students, and parishioners. Those groups of people have become my second family for 25 years. Four years ago I had the privilege of adding to that "second family" when Little Flower School formed a partnership with the former Our Lady of Lourdes School.

There will be many things that I know that I will miss. I will miss the children the most. Those students can take a day that has hints of not going well and turn

it around with smiles, stories, hug, good comments. I told teachers they might find me wandering the parking lot on the first day of school, unable to fully withdraw from the excitement of starting another year.

Things have changed dramatically since the day in July, 1989 that I walked into the school building and set off the security alarm! It was one way to announce my arrival. I have had the opportunity -- no, the privilege -- to work with seven fabulous



pastors who have always been supportive of the school ministry.

Of course, the biggest change I was part of is the 2010 forming of St. Benedict School. We were able to do that through discussion, challenge, and compromise, always with a focus on the best interest of the students entrusted to us. Our process in forming St. Benedict is known as a success story and we are proud of that.

The advancement of technology in the school was a huge advancement during my time as principal minister. When I arrived there were about 10 computers in a classroom; now we have around 140 in the building. Quite a change.


Some folks have asked my thoughts on the future of Catholic education. I am positive it will continue and will provide the faith-based quality

education we now provide. It might look different. As we know, there will be fewer schools, and perhaps different configurations. But it is my fervent hope that even if it looks different, it won't feel different. I hope it maintains the wonderful community spirit and spirituality that a Catholic school can provide.

Thanks to everyone for all the good wishes for me in my rtirement. I will miss all of you as I move on to that new chapter. St. Benedict and Little Flower schools will always have a special place in my heart as will all the wonderful people who have touched my life during these years.
